



Mediations at Girls Rehabilitation Facility ease tensions between detainees

The Pro Bono Program Mediation Program and its partner, RJMP (Restorative Justice Mediation Program) are pleased to announce a collaboration with the California Western School of Law's mediation program. Cal Western pioneered a revolutionary mediation program at Juvenile Hall and the Girls Rehabilitation Facility in 1998, and we are excited to join them in this program.

Mediations at Juvenile Hall involve disputes between detainees whose ages range from 10 to 19. The disputes include name-calling, theft of personal property, gang-related problems and a host of other issues that arise from living in close quarters with no ability to leave. The mediations do not involve any aspect of the juvenile's delinquency matter.

The mediations are conducted in an open room with facility staff present. While many juveniles request mediations, others are mandatory and required by unit staff. Girls Rehabilitation Facility mediations differ from other mediations in that they are fast paced – as many as ten mediations can be carried out in a two-hour period. Mediations carried out by volunteers are often the only means available to enable detainees to live

peaceably and to finish their sentences with the least amount of trouble.

Currently, the mediations are conducted by Cal Western law students who are enrolled in the school's Advanced Mediation class. Attorney Talisha Martin supervises the students. The program had operated during the school year, and the program was dormant when the students are on vacation. In order to bridge the gap between vacations and class, the Pro Bono Program has proposed to continue the mediations during Cal Western vacations, in order to provide continuity for the disputants and facility staff.

The mediation program is a rewarding experience for the disputants and the volunteers, who view the experience as an opportunity to make a real difference in the lives of troubled youth. The facility staff also has found the mediations to be an invaluable means of easing tensions.

New clinic for homeless has begun!

Due to a generous grant from the San Diego County Bar Foundation, the Pro Bono Program was able to begin a one-of-a-kind Civil Legal Clinic for the homeless in San Diego County.

For many years, Public Defender and homeless advocate, **Steven Binder** has been managing the Homeless Court in San Diego County. Through his tireless efforts, many homeless have been assisted with their criminal issues. However, over the years, Steve began to find that those same clients also had civil legal issues that needed resolution. Due to the difficulty in obtaining transportation and the numerous difficulties of life on the streets, many of the homeless were unable to access legal services for their civil legal issues.

Upon determining the problem, the Pro Bono Program teamed up with the Homeless Court to create a one-of-a-kind, “one-stop shop” for the homeless. Once a month, attorneys from the Pro Bono Program work at the Homeless Court. Steve Binder and his team work on criminal issues and, in a separate office, the Pro Bono Program's legal team works with clients on civil legal issues.

This program has created a seamless referral service between the Pro Bono Program and the Homeless Court and significantly increases access to legal services for homeless individuals.

Sara Raffer recently began her third year as a full-time staff attorney with the Pro Bono Program at LASSD. Sara supervises court legal clinics, coordinates volunteers and interns, operates the family, victim/offender and peer mediation program, as well as works on collaborations with the minority bars in San Diego.

Sara is a native San Diegan, who grew up in Chula Vista and attended Hilltop High School. She decided to brave the cold of New England and attend Brandeis University located near Boston, Massachusetts. Sara graduated from Brandeis with a double major in American Studies and Philosophy. After deciding that New England weather was not for her, she returned to

California to attend McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento and graduated with a tax concentration.

Sara began her legal career as a volunteer with LASSD. After passing the bar exam in 2003, Sara immediately began working at the Unlawful Detainer Assistance Program in East County with former LASSD staff attorney **Elsa Carre**, Esq. Elsa referred cases to Sara in family law and Unlawful Detainer. Elsa mentored Sara through the cases and obtained successful outcomes for the clients. Sara was also referred an SSI appeal for a child with developmental disabilities in which she obtained a favorable outcome for the client. Sara was soon hired as an independent contractor and several months later, she was hired as a full-time staff attorney.

In her free time, Sara is also an adjunct professor at Southwestern College in Chula Vista, where she teaches a class to paralegal students on civil litigation.

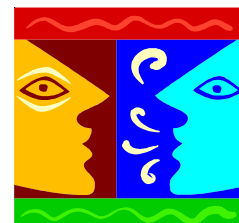
Exciting new victim/offender mediation from the Public Defender's office

The collaboration between the Pro Bono Program Mediation Program and Restorative Justice Mediation Program (RJMP) has seen an increase in its victim/offender mediation referrals from the Public Defender's Juvenile Division. RJMP has a great many volunteer mediators who are assisting in scheduling and conducting the mediations. **Sara Raffer**, Esq. continues to coordinate this program and works closely with RJMP board members on new ways to obtain referrals and to educate the community about the positive effects resulting from these types of mediations.

The Victim/Offender mediation can be positive for all parties involved. The program allows victims to receive restitution for their damages and learn more about the incident. Victims can also feel that they have obtained closure on the case when they are able to talk with the offender face-to-face. Offenders receive an opportunity to "make it right" with their victim and to take responsibility for their actions. Offenders learn the impact of their action on their victims. They have the power to rectify the situation.

The community also benefits as offenders may be less likely to re-offend. In some cases, the community directly benefits by the restitution, for example, when the victim is a school, city or other organization.

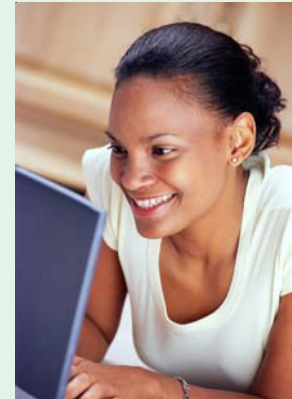

Update on Children and Youth Advocacy Project

The Children & Youth Advocacy Project (CYAP) continues to support transition-age youth with disabilities through direct representation, pro se legal clinics and education. Project supervisor **Summer Stech**, Equal Justice Works fellow, advocates on behalf of school age youth who are transitioning from school to post-secondary school, work or other post-school endeavors. In addition to direct legal representation, Summer presents Legal Life Skills training seminars to youth with developmental disabilities to promote self-advocacy. Summer’s focus on legal education in the community has proven successful in assisting youth with developmental disabilities in becoming advocates for their legal rights in the areas of education, government benefits, vocation and personal liberties.

Summer has recently completed the first six months of her fellowship, and in this short time has established herself as an asset to the special education legal community. Despite the importance of her work, Summer remains the only special education attorney in the area of transition in the San Diego area providing free legal services to low-income families. The importance of such work is highlighted by the recent filing of a federal class action suit in Los Angeles by several disabled teenagers against the Montebello Unified School District and the California Department of Education. The suit is the first class action ever filed in California over this issue and will hopefully result in improved school-to-adult transition services for the state’s special education students. The outcome of such litigation will have a major effect on the work that Summer is doing through the CYAP.

Recent case story demonstrates importance of CYAP services

D.B. is a 17-year-old foster youth who lives with his maternal aunt. The Public Defender Dependency Section referred D.B.’s case to the Children and Youth Advocacy Project because the minor’s counsel felt that D.B. was not receiving needed transition services. Minor’s counsel was concerned that when D.B. aged out of the dependency system at 18, he would not be prepared for work or post-secondary education. The counsel wanted someone to advocate on his behalf before it was too late.

Working with the staff at the young man’s alternative school, Summer advocated for him at his Individualized Education Program (IEP) meeting. Her efforts focused on ensuring that D.B.’s IEP team was considering his post-school preferences and needs and providing services to reach his goals. Thanks to Summer’s representation, D.B. is now on track to receive a high school diploma and enter into a transition program next school year. He will have help enrolling in community college and will receive vocational training. Summer will continue to advocate for D.B. as his IEP team moves forward.

The tax man cometh? Low-income taxpayers have powerful ally

As 2006 gave way to 2007, another tax season began throughout our country. For many low-income taxpayers in San Diego County, the tax season is the beginning of a confusing and sometimes tortuous process of dealing with the IRS. The Legal Aid Society of San Diego's Pro Bono Program Low-Income Taxpayer Clinic (LITC) helps level the "playing field" by providing legal advice and advocating for taxpayers who are having problems with their income taxes (collection problems, refund denials, innocent spouse claims, etc.) and who cannot afford to hire an attorney or C.P.A. The Legal Aid Society also teams with Home Start, Inc., which provides tax education to non-English speaking taxpayers throughout the county.

The LITC is funded in part by a grant from the IRS. Impressed with the achievements of our LITC, the IRS recently awarded the Legal Aid Society and Home Start a grant of \$70,500 for 2007. These funds provide the financial backbone for LITC staff, who handle cases and coordinate volunteer assignments. We are extremely grateful to the attorneys and other professionals who take cases and help at our walk-in clinics, as the case load continues to grow. We are also very glad for the contributions of law students like **Edward Kramer** and **Aubrey Hone**. New Bankruptcy Clinic meets critical need

Thanks to a generous "cy pres" award from a consumer class action lawsuit, the Legal Aid Society opened a new bankruptcy practice area in 2006. Headed up by the Legal Aid Society's senior attorney **Jason Turner**, this clinic helps low-income persons who need protection under the federal bankruptcy laws to preserve needed assets and/or income. The Bankruptcy Clinic provides advice to consumers on current bankruptcy law and, in appropriate cases, files bankruptcy petitions and represents debtors in court, with chapter 7 cases predominating.

While bankruptcy filings have decreased significantly in our district and nationwide since the passage of bankruptcy legislation in 2005, Jason Turner points out that there is a large, unmet need for bankruptcy help among San Diego's working poor. "For the single parent who's getting no child support from the other parent, or for a family saddled with enormous medical debts because they had no health insurance during a medical emergency, or for the person who incurred large debts before or during drug addiction and is now in recovery, often the only way for them to move toward financial self-sufficiency is to get relief from their debts."

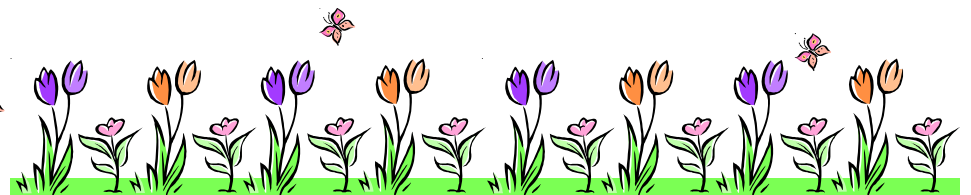
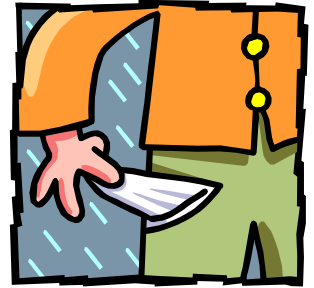

Conservatorship Clinic

Volunteer assists with troubling case

E. R. came to the Conservatorship clinic in August 2006 after his wife had a stroke. The family bank account was in the wife's name alone, so E.R. needed conservatorship of the person and estate in order to make healthcare decisions for his wife and manage the family finances. There were three minor children involved and the wife was the sole breadwinner, while E.R. stayed home with their special needs child. **Keeley Luhn**, of **Albence &**

Associates, APC, agreed to assist E.R. on a pro bono basis. It took months of paperwork and negotiation with the court-appointed attorney for the wife, but in February 2007, E.R. was appointed conservator of the person and a fiduciary was appointed conservator of the estate. The wife regained consciousness during the conservatorship process and has since recovered to such a point that it is anticipated that the conservatorship may be terminated before the end of the year.

Brigham Fordham of Morrison & Foerster LLP helps mobile park tenant

Recently, **Brigham Fordham**, a long time attorney with **Morrison & Foerster LLP** and a dedicated volunteer with the Legal Aid Society of San Diego, Inc. Pro Bono Program, agreed to assist an elderly client in Oceanside who had been taken advantage of by the mobile home park owner.



Over the course of many years, all of the tenants at the mobile home park received rent increases in violation of the local rent control laws, thus creating huge revenues for the park owner. The tenants were not aware of these rent control laws and were simply taken advantage of, given their ages and disabilities.

The City of Oceanside stepped in and worked with the clients to attempt to stop the fraud. However, it was clear an attorney was needed to ultimately resolve the issue. The clients contacted the Legal Aid Society of San Diego, Inc. and within a week were able to obtain a pro bono attorney to help with their case.

We are thankful a firm like **Morrison & Foerster LLP** has agreed to take on such a case. This case has the potential of involving numerous clients, changing the way a large mobile home park is operated in North County and having a positive impact on hundreds of low-income individuals.

New Afternoon Domestic Violence Clinic!

On December 1, 2006, the South Bay Courthouse Domestic Violence Clinic extended its hours. An afternoon clinic is now open Monday-Friday from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. We are very excited that we are now available to help more petitioners and respondents in pro per throughout the day.

With the extended hours, we have been able to help over 200 clients in just three months with DV petitions, answers, elder abuse petitions, advice and counsel. We expect for the clinic to grow with the help of community outreach and presentations throughout the South Bay Community.

In addition, we would like to welcome **Rebecca Davalos**, our new contract attorney who assists at the DV afternoon clinic along with our other wonderful volunteers.
